Dear companion in mission,

The COVID pandemic challenged us like nothing else in our short history. In this time of global change, it is easy to feel out of sync with the needs of the world. But grounding ourselves in a larger story of faith, compassion and hope can also give rise to the courage to do the necessary work of God's mission of love.

If 2020 turned our world upside down, perhaps 2021 allowed us to see what we are capable of as a community. In our 2021 journey, more than 45 Maryknoll lay missioners remained in mission despite the challenges presented by the pandemic. Together with their communities, they responded to new and wide-ranging needs, adapted to the obstacles that continued to rise with ever-changing restrictions and sought new and creative ways of shared accompaniment. Throughout, our lay missioners demonstrated remarkable tenacity and a sense of renewal grounded in a deepened call to journey with our sisters and brothers on the margins — a journey that embraces the reality that all life is sacred, precious and connected. The stories in this report are but a small sampling of this belief and the journeys to which it led in 2021.

2021 also helped us to see that the task of nurturing a vocation enlivening God's mission in the world is more important than ever before. In December, we sent 13 new missioners to journey to five countries, our largest class since 2005. More importantly, with an eye to the future, Maryknoll lay missioners embarked on another journey — one of exploring mission in the 21st century.

Between April and December, our community engaged in a period of intense reflection and dialogue as part of an Expanded Mission Assembly process* that would culminate in 2022. Our process helped us to see that, despite the uncertainty and disorder of our world, the Spirit is awakening us to deeper transformation, love and hope.

Amid the global need for healing, we are discovering an invitation to depth and something new. Not only did we begin to examine our mission, vision and values, but we also embarked on questions about our structure, the make-up of membership and our approach to mission.

The mission assembly journey thus far has renewed our energy and commitment for mission. New questions and challenges have emerged as well. Through it all, we have remained confident that this creative space is opening a door to a renewed vision that will build upon our 46 years of global mission and guide Maryknoll Lay Missioners into a vibrant and dynamic future.

As it has been throughout these 46 years, all of this — the work of our lay missioners combined with the efforts and resilience of the individuals and communities they accompany — is possible because of friends and supporters like you. Maryknoll Lay Missioners exists because of thousands of people like you who support us, donate to us, encourage us and stand with us as we try to create a just and compassionate world.

Just as it is true of our lay missioners, so, too, are you woven into the fabric of every community. So, too, have you provided a hopeful, brave voice for the world when it was most needed. Our hearts are filled with gratitude.

As we continue to navigate the pandemic in the months and years ahead, may we renew our journey together, ever committed to God's mission of love and the promise of a future in which all may truly live as one.

Moving toward a **RENEWED VISION & FUTURE =**


he Year 2021 saw Maryknoll Lay Missioners continue to adapt and respond to the challenges of the COVID-19 pandemic.

Missioners, staff and board also engaged in an extensive Mission Assembly process that created space for crucial conversations about the future of mission in the 21st century and around renewing our organization's vision, mission and core values.

That process laid the groundwork for an Expanded Mission Assembly, the first in 13 years, which would take place the following February.

During 2021, we continued to hold well-received virtual events, including several discernment retreats, a Pentecost celebration, our annual jubilee gathering and a prayer service for World Mission Sunday that also included the presentation of our 2021 Bishop McCarthy Spirit of Mission Award.

In 2020, COVID had forced an unprecedented interruption in our annual Orientation and Sending processes, but

In August, we mourned the death of one of our co-founders, Maryknoll Father Jack Sullivan. When the Maryknoll Lay Missioner program was officially established in 1975, he was its first director. Throughout our history, he collaborated closely with us and remained a spiritual guide, mentor and enthusiastic cheerleader to the association.

Marty Roers, a returned Maryknoll lay missioner (Class of 1995 - Kenya and Sudan) and a leader in global justice advocacy and mission education, was honored as the 2021 recipient of the Bishop John E. 
